Course Description

Objective:

This course is for students to explore contemporary political system of China, with a special focus on its policy making process. The emphasis is on China's political structure, state and society relations. This course aims to provide students with a background on major political events in modern China, and then to investigate the current political issues in China today—environmental civil society activity, problems and benefits associated with continuing economic liberalization, and discourse from within the CCP on political reform.

Students who are interested in Contemporary China's politics, society, and innovation policy

Proceeding of the Course

The course will be delivered through lectures, in-class discussions, field trip to Zhongguancun Innovation Center and local residential community, etc. Students' participation is required. Students will be required to submit a term research paper to complete the course. Paper's due day will be Aug. 15, 2019
