

# GLOBAL GOVERNANCE PROGRAM

## INTRODUCTION

The **TOItaly Global Governance Program** is a comprehensive program of 11 days of seminars and workshops designed to provide an in-depth exploration of the theme of **Global Governance towards the UN Pact for the Future**. A variety of topics such as Global Economy, Innovation, Social Policies and Peace Building will be covered during tailored lectures, workshops, guided visits and excursions in Turin, Milan and Rome. This program is promoted by the TOChina Hub at the University of Turin exclusively for Peking University students.

## CONTENTS

The TOItaly Global Governance Program entails two different formats for student engagement:

- ❖ **Classes** - lectures with experts, to be held mostly in class;
- ❖ **Experiences** - a hands-on session connected to the topic of the previous class, so as to try out from a practical point of view what has been discussed on a theoretical level.

## FACULTY MEMBERS

**Giovanni B. ANDORNINO** is a tenured Assistant Professor of International Relation of East Asia at the Department of Cultures, Politics and Society of the University of Turin, Director of the TOChina Centre, Founder and Secretary General of the China-Italy Philanthropy Forum. Professor Andornino is also Vice-President of the Torino World Affairs Institute (T.wai) and Director of the China Management & Business Program at Zhejiang University's ZIBS, former Editor of *OrizzonteCina*. His research activity mainly focuses on: domestic and foreign policy of the People's Republic of China, China's relations with Italy and the wider Euro-Mediterranean region. Professor Andornino was made a Commander of the Order of Merit of the Italian Republic by President Sergio Mattarella in 2021.

**Daniele B. COLOGNA** is an Associate Professor of Chinese language, history and culture at the University of Insubria (Como) and a Research fellow of the Torino World Affairs Institute (T.wai). He studied Chinese in the People's Republic of China between 1987 and 1993. He applies social research in the field of migration studies, and teaches Chinese language, culture and history at various Italian universities. Since 2014 he has been a member of the editorial board of *OrizzonteCina*, for which he curates the *Cines/italiani* column. He has served as co-director of the journal in 2020. He has published numerous essays and academic articles on foreign immigration (especially Chinese) in Italy and on the way in which growing cultural, ethnic, linguistic and religious pluralism is transforming Italian society and culture, as well as on the intercultural dynamics between Chinese and non-Chinese.

**Anna CAFFARENA** is Full Professor of International Relations at the University of Turin, Italy, where she is also academic coordinator of the Master in International Sciences. She is Chairwoman of the Torino World Affairs Institute (T.wai) overseeing its three research programs: Global China, Asia Prospects and Violence & Security. Her research interests include world order issues sparked by emerging China and multilateralism. Her most recent book, *Thucydides Trap and other images*.

*Why world politics seems never to change* (il Mulino, Bologna 2018, in Italian) focuses on the role of images in perpetuating the security dilemma in world politics, and in particular how this specific social representation impinges on the crucial relationship between China and the United States.

**Giuseppe GABUSI** is an Associate Professor of Global Political Economy and Political Economy of East Asia at the Department of Cultures, Politics and Society of the University of Turin. He is among the co-founders of T.wai, the Torino World Affairs Institute, where he heads the “Asia Prospects” Program and edits RISE, the only open access journal in Italy on contemporary South-East Asia. He has been a visiting scholar at the Australian National University, the East-West Center in Honolulu, and Warwick University.

**Stefano RUZZA** is an Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Turin. He is Head of Program at T.wai, the Torino World Affairs Institute, with responsibility over the “Violence and Security” research area. His research interests are conflict transformation (with a focus on Myanmar and Uganda), non-state armed actors in international relations and, more specifically, private military and security companies (PMSCs). In his teaching activity, he makes extensive use of innovative methodologies (e.g. role-playing and simulations). Prof. Ruzza lectures regularly in advanced educational programs of the Italian Army, and is responsible for the Italian translation of the world-renown SIPRI Yearbook Summary. He is a member of the Italian Ethnological Mission in Equatorial Africa and the scientific director of the Engaging Conflict Summer School ([www.engagingconflict.it](http://www.engagingconflict.it)), an advanced training program designed to critically understand conflict and tackle it as a dynamic reality.

**Ruth SANTINI** is an Associate Professor of Politics and International Relations at the University of Naples L’Orientale. She has recently worked as conflict advisor for the World Food Program. She has published widely on Italian and European foreign policy, Middle East and North African politics and security. She is currently working on food security, Central Sahel politics, and humanitarian principles after the war in Ukraine.

## ADMISSIONS

The TOItaly Global Governance Program is designed for highly motivated students from Peking University seeking an organic set of crash courses exploring Global Governance from an Italian and European point of view. Its hands-on approach and intimate setting allow participants to appreciate some of the most salient features of contemporary politics, society, economy.

## TUITION FEES

**Tuition Fees include:** lectures, visits and related transfers, accommodation both in Turin and in Rome, lunches in Turin at the university canteen, long distance transportation (specifically trains from Turin to Milan and back, and from Turin to Rome), a welcome aperitif and a farewell lunch.

### Who can apply for the TOItaly Program?

The TOItaly Global Governance Program is designed exclusively for PKU students.



### **Who organizes the program?**

The program is designed by the TOChina Hub, a partnership between the University of Turin, ESCP Business School and the Torino World Affairs Institute (T.wai).

### **When is the TOItaly Program held?**

The 2024 edition of the TOItaly Global Governance Program is held from July 15<sup>th</sup> to 26<sup>th</sup>.

### **What is the venue hosting the program?**

The program is held at different venues in Turin, Milan and Rome. Classes in Turin will be held at the “Luigi Einaudi” Campus of the University of Turin. Classes in Milan will be held at the “Giangiacomo Feltrinelli” Foundation. Classes in Rome will be held at prestigious venues such as the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Vatican (tbc).

### **What kind of certification will be awarded at the end of the program?**

Participants are awarded a certificate issued by the TOChina Hub. If participants need to convert the program into academic credits at their home university, they will also receive a certificate as proof of the skills acquired.
